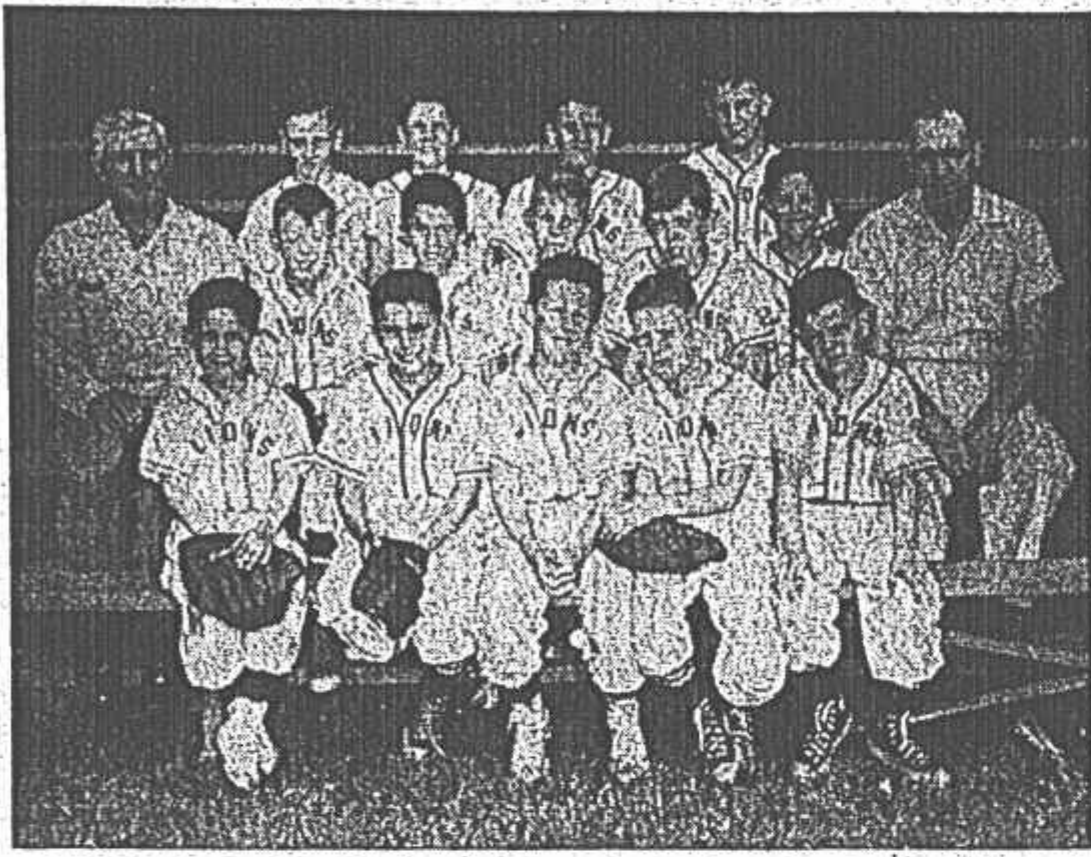


Tied For First Place

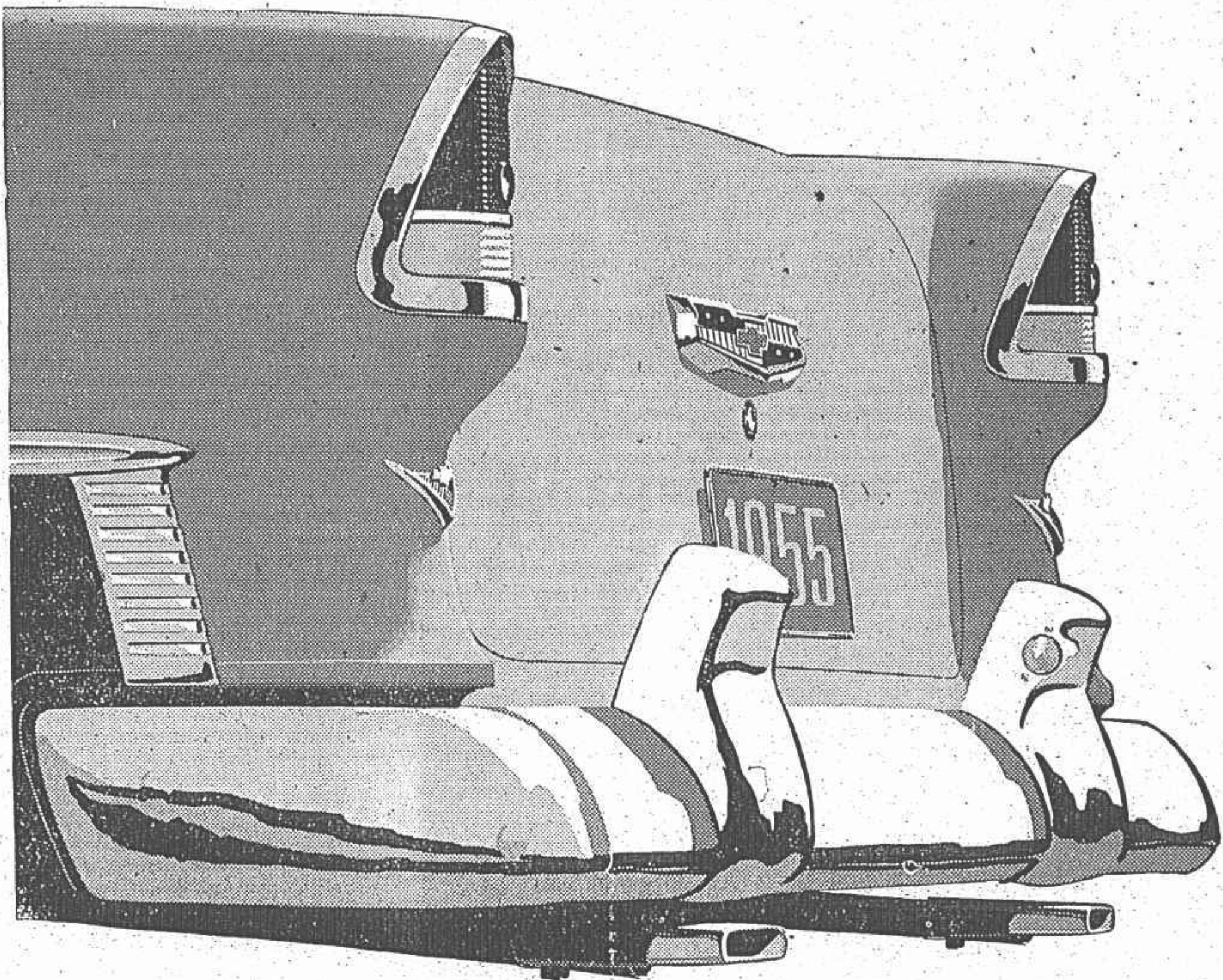

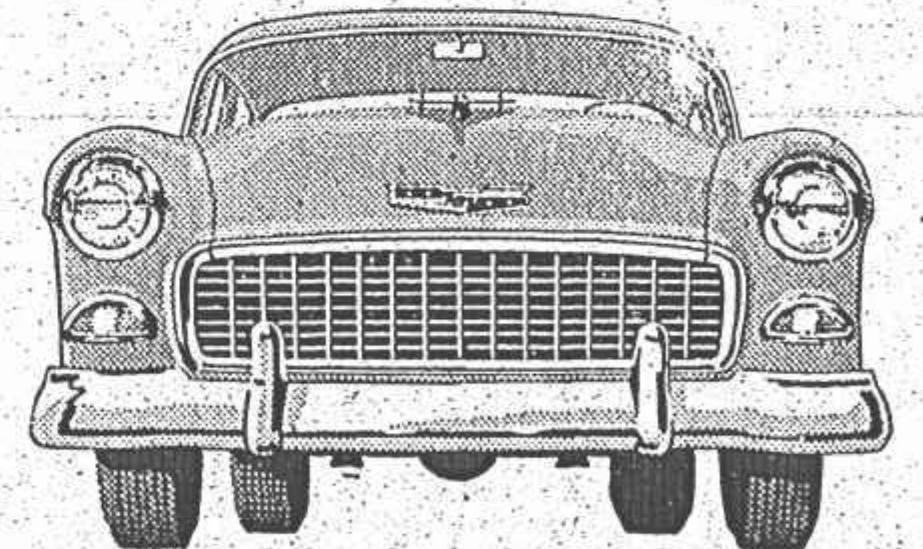
