Last week it was Fairport's infield which spelled defeat for Scholls. Carl Hanselman, our field Captain started all three of our double plays. Carl also added a timely hit good for two insurance runs, so all in all Carl had himself a good night. Also a stand out last week was young Tommy Moore. Tom played a fine third base and made some spectacular catches of which Willie Mays himself would have been proud. Harry Ebner continued his fine pitching, but this week's credit must be given to the defensive unit, for with out their heads up ball playing the outcome might have been a bit different. Fairport Motors are at current the sole leaders of the league with a 4-0 record. And if the team continues its excellent brand of baseball they will walk away with the championship for which they have set their sights.

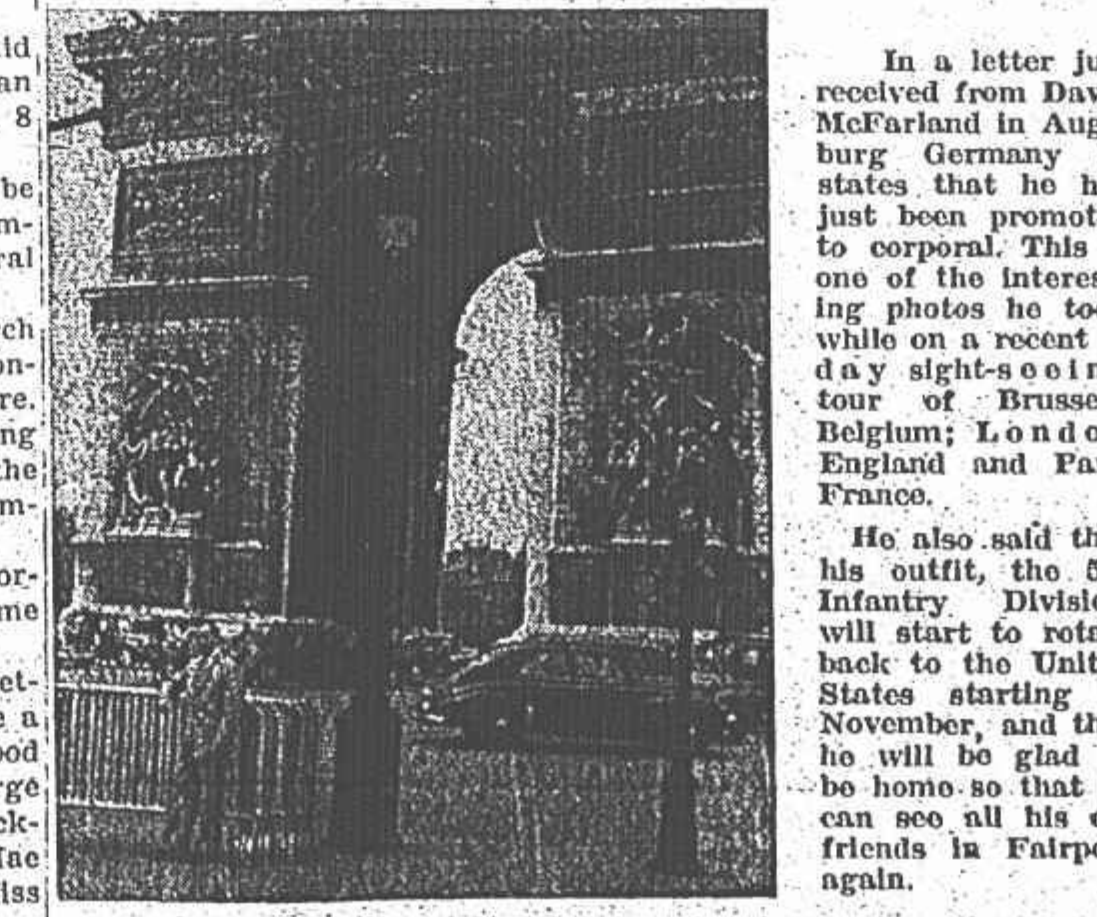
